Certain aspects of how the world works are just not my responsibility, and to waste energy in worrying or getting frustrated at things I cannot change seems a waste of time.

However, when does it become my responsibility?

In our modern society, Racism is unacceptable! We have a direct responsibility (in my opinion) to confront it and eradicate it from our culture. Excluding or judging certain people on skin colour alone is abhorrent. Behaviour - whatever skin colour is a different issue.

The 'megalomaniac's' of our society have a lot to answer for in our modern world. This is probably a little unfair on each of us - but can we be sure that the 'Putin's' and 'Netanyahu's' of our own heart are kept checked and will not wreak havoc in the interactions and relationships in our own lives. Because it is as simple and as complicated as that. Are we people for peace? Or will we blame those around us constantly to justify our actions and exclusivity and bad behaviour? # TODAY'S READINGS FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading:

**Ezekiel 37:1-14** 

### A reading from the prophet Ezekiel

The hand of the Lord was on me, and he brought me out by the Spirit of the Lord and set me in the middle of a vallev: it was full of bones. He led me to and fro among them, and I saw a great many bones on the floor of the valley, bones that were very dry. He asked me, 'Son of man, can these bones live?' I said, 'Sovereign Lord, you alone know.' Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to these bones and say to them, "Dry bones, hear the word of the Lord! This is what the Sovereign Lord says to these bones: I will make breath enter you, and you will come to life. I will attach tendons to you and make flesh come upon you and cover you with skin; I will put breath in you, and you will come to life. Then you will know that I am the Lord ." So I prophesied as I was commanded. And as I was prophesying, there was a noise, a rattling sound, and the bones came together, bone to bone. I looked, and tendons and flesh appeared on them and skin covered them, but there was no breath in them. Then he said to me. 'Prophesy to the breath; prophesy, son of man, and say to it, "This is what the Sovereign Lord says: come, breath, from the four winds and breathe into these may live." So that they slain. prophesied as he commanded me, and breath entered them; they came to life and stood up on their feet - a vast army. Then he said to me: 'Son of man, these bones are the people of Israel. They say, "Our bones are dried up and hope is gone; we are off." Therefore prophesy and say to them: "This is what the Sovereign Lord says: my people, I am going to open your graves and bring you up from them; I will bring you back to the land of Israel.

Then you, my people, will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and bring you up from them. I will put my Spirit in you and you will live, and I will settle you in your own land. Then you will know that I the Lord have spoken, and I have done it, declares the Lord .""

### A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans

The mind governed by the flesh is death, but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace. The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. Those who are in the realm of the flesh cannot please God. You, however, are not in the realm of the flesh but are in the realm of the Spirit, if indeed the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, they do not belong to Christ. But if Christ is in you, then even though your body is

subject to death because of sin, the Spirit gives life because of righteousness. And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you.

### A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John

# Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory!

#### Gospel: John 11:1-45

Now a man named Lazarus was ill. He was from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. (This Mary, whose brother Lazarus now lay ill, was the same one who poured perfume on the Lord and wiped his feet with her hair.) So the sisters sent word to Jesus, 'Lord, the one you love is ill.' When he heard this, Jesus said, 'This illness will not end in death. No, it is for God's glory so that God's Son may be glorified through it.' Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed where he was two more days, and then he said to his disciples, 'Let us go back to Judea.' 'But Rabbi,' they said, 'a short while ago the Jews there tried to stone you, and yet you are going back?' Jesus answered, 'Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Anyone who walks in the daytime will not stumble, for they see by this world's light. It is when a person walks at night that they stumble, for they have no

light.' After he had said this, he went on to tell them, 'Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep; but I am going there to wake him up.' His disciples replied, 'Lord, if he sleeps, he will get better.' Jesus had been speaking of his death, but his disciples thought he meant natural sleep. So then he told them plainly, 'Lazarus is dead, and for your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him.' Then Thomas (also known as Didymus) said to the rest of the disciples, 'Let us also go, that we may die with him.' On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was less than two miles from Jerusalem, and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them in the loss of their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed at home. 'Lord,' Martha said to Jesus, 'if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask.' Jesus said to her, 'Your brother will rise again.' Martha answered, 'I know he will rise again in the resurrection at the day.' Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?' 'Yes, Lord,' she replied, 'I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world.' After she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary aside. 'The Teacher is here,' she said, 'and is asking for you.' When Mary heard this, she got up quickly and went to him. Now Jesus had not yet entered the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. When the Jews who had been with Mary in the house, comforting her, noticed how quickly she got up and went out, they followed her, supposing she was going to the tomb to mourn there. When Mary reached the place where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would

not have died.' When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come along with her also weeping, he was deeply moved spirit in troubled. 'Where have you laid him?' he asked. 'Come and see, Lord,' they replied. Jesus wept. Then the Jews said, 'See how he loved him!' But some of them said, 'Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?' Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. 'Take away the stone,' he said. 'But, Lord,' said Martha, the sister of the dead man, 'by this time there is a bad odour, for he has been there four days.' Then Jesus said, 'Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, 'Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me.' When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!' The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Take off the grave clothes and let him go.' Therefore many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary, and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.

"There was no question which one he was. The air vibrated on the note of hope. I was transfixed. To me he was a beacon, lit from within, and as I walked the crowd simply parted. Power surged from him. Others didn't seem to notice. I had long ago run out of prayers, run out of words. I knew that all I needed was to touch him, his clothes, his sandals. My hand reached out. Flesh on fabric. Rapture. Gasping intake of breath, as if I'd been underwater for a decade. Slow burning, surging flood of tears.

No blood. No blood. Dry, and clean, and over.

No-one noticed. I was invisible. The crowd moved on.

Then he turned. "Who touched me?" they laughed. Who hadn't.

"Who touched me?" Eyes on me. Fixed. Understanding. I knelt. I confessed.

"Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering."

He took my hand. Dared to touch me. He raised me to my feet. He set me free.

No blood.

Three years now and there has been nothing but the normal blood. I am like the others. There has been no blood now for five months. Life stirs.

Benjamin brings me dates. Eli will be fifteen soon and he will marry. We are still learning each other, after all those years of separation. His children will play at my feet, and I will cook for them and teach them to greet each morning as a gift. I will speak to them of Jesus, who the elders say is dead - but who they desperately fear is alive. Jesus, who bled. We have learned much of what he said, and Benjamin and I break the bread and share the wine with others foolish enough to hope.

There is so much bleeding in the world. There is so much healing to be done."
