I know that meeting in the Parish Centre and/or not having communion at the moment doesn't suit everybody ...

... I take responsibility for this. I'm working on how we can get back into church as soon as possible. As you can imagine - to offer choice and service availability and comply with COVIDSafe requirements to ensure that more people than less can re-connect as a faith community within our beloved building is proving a little tricky. I have a meeting with our COVIDSafe Warden regarding all the above this weekend - and will 'have a plan' to share with you.

I think I will be offering communion sooner than I have previously foreshadowed.

As our Scripture states: "For where two or three are gathered in my name - I am there among them." (Matt 18:20) As Matthew has been encouraging us this year - it is the attitude we bring to fellowship that is paramount and necessary for the survival of any faith community. What happens, and how it happens, and who does what is supposed to happen - are important and necessary, but essentially Salvation (a return to wholeness) and our relationship with God in fellowship with one another is where God meets us - in our vulnerability and humanity. In our willingness to bear each others' burdens and rejoice in another's joys - this is where God meets us. In our willingness to 'make the most' of a difficult situation and realize that we are not alone - this is where God meets us.

I feel that COVID has challenged that 'sense of community' which we all relied upon for our well-being in more ways than one. Our 'faith community' is being tested still - and I feel we are currently a little dis-jointed as we try to adapt to the circumstances before us. Is this a 'COVID-factor' alone? I hope so.

TODAY'S READINGS PENTECOST 23

First Reading: Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-25

A reading from the Book of Joshua

Then Joshua assembled all the tribes of Israel at Shechem. He summoned the elders, leaders, judges and officials of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Joshua said to all the people, 'This is what the Lord , the God of Israel, says: "Long ago your ancestors, including Terah the father of Abraham and Nahor, lived beyond the River Euphrates and worshipped other gods. But I took your father Abraham from the land beyond the Euphrates and led him throughout Canaan and gave him many descendants. I gave him Isaac, 'Now fear the Lord and serve him with all faithfulness. Throw away the gods your ancestors worshipped beyond the River Euphrates and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served beyond the Euphrates, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you are living. But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord .' Then the people answered, 'Far be it from us to forsake the Lord to serve other gods! It was the Lord our God himself who brought us and our parents up out of Egypt, from that land of slavery, and performed those great signs before our eyes. He protected us on our entire journey and among all the nations through which we travelled. And the Lord drove out before us all the nations, including the Amorites, who lived in the land. We too will serve the Lord, because he is our God.' Joshua said to the people, 'You are not able to serve the Lord . He is a holy God; he is a jealous God. He will not forgive your rebellion and your sins. If you forsake the Lord and serve foreign gods, he will turn and bring disaster on you and make an end of you, after he has been good to you.' But the people said to Joshua, 'No! We will serve the Lord .' Then Joshua said, 'You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen to serve the Lord .' 'Yes, we are witnesses,' they replied. 'Now then,' said Joshua, 'throw away the foreign gods that are among you and yield your hearts to the Lord, the God of Israel.' And the people said to Joshua, 'We will serve the Lord our God and obey him.' On that day Joshua made a covenant for the people, and there at Shechem he reaffirmed for them decrees and laws.

A reading from the first letter to the Thessalonians

Now about your love for one another we do not need to write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love each other. And in fact, you do love all of God's family throughout Macedonia. Yet we urge you, brothers and sisters, to do so more and more, and to make it your ambition to lead a quiet life: you should mind your own business and work with your hands, just as we told you, so that your daily life may win the respect of outsiders and so that you will not be dependent on anybody. Brothers and sisters, we do not want you to be uninformed about those who sleep in death, so that you do not grieve like the rest of mankind, who have no hope. For we believe that Jesus died and rose again, and so we believe that God will bring with Jesus those who have fallen asleep in him. According to the Lord's word, we tell you that we who are still alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will certainly not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord for ever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

The Sustainable Development Goals are the blueprint to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all.

Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions

Conflict, insecurity, weak institutions and limited access to justice remain a great threat to sustainable development. The number of people fleeing war, persecution and conflict exceeded 70 million in 2018, the highest level recorded by the UN refugee agency (UNHCR) in almost 70 years.

In 2019, the United Nations tracked 357 killings and 30 enforced disappearances of human rights defenders, journalists and trade unionists in 47 countries. And the births of around one in four children under age 5 worldwide are never officially recorded, depriving them of a proof of legal identity crucial for the protection of their rights and for access to justice and social services.

As you will have read in dNews, I have been facilitating a conversation with a number of people across the Diocese who have participated voluntarily in a conversation about the relevance and sustainability of the future of the church. The Encounter Days have explored many issues related to our beloved institution and they have been honest, open and inspiring conversation as we have reflected on 'The Road to Emmaus' Gospel story in Luke 24.

In our church tradition on the whole, and particularly in my experience in Diocese of Ballarat so far, we have honoured the Holy WORD (Luke 24:19-27) – at least through proclamation in church but not necessarily through study or discussion. We have honoured the Holy Sacrament (Luke 24:28-31) – where Christ is made known to us as we share in broken bread and poured wine. It seems as though Holy Witness (Luke 24:32-35) – has been less obvious as part of our church tradition. Has 'Holy Witness' been forgotten? Have people been disempowered to tell others of what Christ has done for them? Have we succumbed to apathy or complacency and expected someone else to 'do our bit.' "I've done 'my bit' for the best of my life young man!" could well be your response.

If our churches are to be full again - what have we to offer those seeking spiritual wellbeing and insight?

If we are to maintain a healthy spiritual life in our Anglican Tradition - what can we do to inspire others to join our fellowship or meet a need or reach out and change someone's life? Can you hear the Holy Spirit calling your name - to act, to engage, to think laterally about being an effective witness? Do we remain a nice and pleasant 'social club'? Do we celebrate our liturgy in a way that most have absolutely no idea what is going on or why they should participate in the first place? Have we rendered our faith community 'dumb and lame' in the face of opposition and the inevitability of irrelevance?

Maybe we - the people of God, the church - need healing more than ever from the one who came and died and rose again for us - the Living God in the person of Jesus: the Christ? Do we need to hear Jesus say, "Your faith has made you well!"

This is the Holy Work of our faith community, and with God's Holy Spirit - forgive and redeem and transform and show this town that there is something 'they WANT' - in that place down the road ...

... that place of welcome and joy and hope and relevance and courage and service and youth and healthy tradition and Emmanuel - God with us!
