I hope that I find you well and in good spirits.

This time last week (as I am writing this) I was wading through the calm waters of St Vincent Gulf - I have never felt that I need to live by the ocean, but when I am there I feel it has a healing effect on me. The sea-strand is one of those 'liminal spaces' for me - I still feel the solid of the earth (as a friend says: "The more firma the less terra.") and yet I start to become part of the 'chaos' of the ocean and everything that lives beneath the surface. On a couple of days, a lone dolphin would eat and play and quietly go about its natural habitat - I think it is one of the great wonders of the world!

As I watch the news, Joe Biden reminds me the role that politicians CAN play in bringing calm to a Nation's heart - I don't know his story and I'm sure the situation is much more complex and imperfect than I am portraying here, however, it seems that his years and years and years of experience representing his nation's people provides a certain 'relief' for want of a better term of what we had become used to through his predecessor.

On Australia Day this week, I heard impassioned voices calling for our own Nation to listen – to listen deeply to our first people's story of land and culture; to listen to the injustice of those who experience sexual violence and abuse; to listen to each other – profoundly and with empathy as we all seek to make a contribution to the land we share and to our local community in whatever capacity we can manage. As we brace ourselves for another year and a pending Lent and Easter Passion - it is time to gird our loins and discern where Jesus is calling us to think differently; to act with courage and compassion; and to help transform that which could destroy us into something that can give us life!

TODAY'S READINGS FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

First Reading:

Deuteronomy 18:15-20

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your fellow Israelites. You must listen to him. For this is what you asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said, 'Let us not hear the voice of the Lord our God nor see this great fire any more, or we will die.' The Lord said to me: 'What they say is good. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their fellow Israelites, and I will put my words in his mouth. He will tell them everything I command him. I myself will call to account anyone who does not listen to my words that the prophet speaks in my name. But a prophet who presumes to speak in my name anything I have not commanded, or a prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, is to be put to death.'

Psalm: 111

Response: The Lord will remember his covenant for ever

1. O praise the Lord. I will praise the Lord with my whole heart: in the company of the upright and among the congregation.
The works of the Lord are great: and studied by all who take delight in them.

Second Reading:

1 Corinthians 8:1-13

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians

Now about food sacrificed to idols: we know that 'We all possess knowledge.' But knowledge puffs up while love builds up. Those who think they something do not yet know as they ought to know. But whoever loves God is known by God. So then, about eating food sacrificed to idols: we know that 'An idol is nothing at all in the world' and that 'There is no God but one.' For even if there are so-called gods, whether in heaven or on earth (as indeed there are many 'gods' and many 'lords'), yet for us there is but one God, the Father, from whom all things came and for whom we

live; and there is but one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom all things came and through whom we live. But not everyone possesses this knowledge. Some people are still so accustomed to idols that when they eat sacrificial food they think of it as having been sacrificed to a god, and since their conscience is weak, it is defiled. But food does not bring us near to God; we are no worse if we do not eat, and no better if we do. Be careful. however, that the exercise of your rights does not become a stumbling-block to the weak. For if someone with a weak conscience sees you, with all your knowledge, eating in an idol's temple, won't that person be emboldened to eat what is sacrificed to idols? So this weak brother or sister, for whom Christ died, is destroyed by your knowledge. When you sin against them in this way and wound their weak conscience. vou sin against Christ. Therefore, if what I eat causes my brother or sister to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again, so that I will not cause them to fall.
