AGM - Priest Report - August 2026

“Do your little bit of good where you are;
it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world.”
[Desmond Tutu]

It is so important to understand that God is most effective when we are grounded and connected within our community. So much of our Christian witness is hidden to others. So much of the Spirit's holy work occurs in small interactions of faithfulness where few eyes are watching.

We are invited by God to participate in building the Kingdom of God - as we are, where we are and with the gifts that are already inherent within us.

We are here to 'make a difference' in people's lives.

First, a huge “Thank you” to everyone in our parish! For deeds seen and unseen, for faithful service recognised or not, for walking ‘with our God’ in faith, hope and love. It matters!

It matters deeply - and as we seek the lost, heal the sick and create spiritual spaces of integrity within our daily lives together and with those who join our pilgrimage within our region - thank you!

It has always been a conviction of mine that the church of the ‘future’ has to work as a team, and my gratitude extends to members of Parish Council whom exercise healthy and wholesome governance within our Parish. It is also a privilege to have a clergy team, and as Rev Fiona continues to settle into her role as Deacon we can look forward to creative and meaningful ways to fulfil our ordination vows and intentions with your accompaniment and encouragement.

Secondly, as always, “Thank you” for having me as your priest. It will be 9 years come December since we embarked on this journey together. There are times when it feels like yesterday that Jill gave me a Jacaranda Tree and said, “*I hope you will be around long enough to see it grow!*” It is growing nicely I have to say and I am wanting to see another few seasons pass through it's branches.

Personally, I am not wanting to rush off anywhere else at the moment. With a new bishop pending in the Diocese, The Shed Project continuing to develop and evolve, I still have plans to further ministry in the parish. As I have been discussing with Parish Council, Vikki and I will be taking a Sabbatical in 2027 for an extended period of time after Easter.

And thirdly, to finish this introduction, we've had a ‘successful’ 140th Year - with all our activities, celebrations and ministry initiatives that have both honoured all who preceded us and all we hold dear today. As a modern faith community - balancing individual preferences and traditions, finding the wonderful Anglican ‘middle way’ within the social milieu of our times and being able to generate energy and vision and hospitality in a variety of ways should not be under-estimated.

Project Regenerate has been a clear, non-intrusive and inclusive ‘spiritual verandah’ that I feel speaks volumes of generosity and faithfulness that has been a gift to our wider community - as well as to our fundamental wellbeing as an Anglican Church. I am feeling very proud - not only of what we have achieved over the last nine years together, but more importantly our willingness to represent Jesus as unique and unpretentious ambassadors of the God who loves us and calls us each by name.

I believe that we have much to offer as a faith community to our town and region, and I am confident that we can continue to grow as the people of God in our next phase of ministry and mission. I also hope that we can continue to challenge ourselves to 'take a step out of the boat' (like Peter) as we are called by Jesus to extend our witness and in the light of the resurrection to help transform and liberate the lives of many.

A Parish Event - A Season of Discernment 2026-2027

As 'agricultural folk' - we are accustomed to the 'seasons' that determine our rhythms and decisions and help us make meaning of our lives in the world. As I have been discussing at Parish Council and will talk more at our AGM - it is time for a 'Year / Season of Discernment.'

Parish Council are unanimous that the season of 'Project Regenerate' has run its natural course. It is time to re-cast a vision and outlook for the parish that is fresh and helps launch the next phase of our faith life together. As the prophet/poet articulates, *"Where there is no vision, the people perish."* [Proverbs 29:18]

Discernment is a wonderful word that is not used as often as it could be. Discernment in practise is actually a daily activity for most of us - as we try and negotiate all decisions - small and large - in our daily lives for clear judgement and wisdom, ie. making smart choices.

The Cambridge Dictionary defines it as: *"Discernment is the ability to judge well, see what is hidden, and tell the difference between truth and falsehood or right and wrong. It comes from a Latin word meaning "to separate", meaning you separate what is true and important from what is fake or useless."*

Discernment - in our faith community context - allows us to explore not just 'what' we want to do, and 'how' we're going to do it , but fundamentally 'WHY' - that helps us to establish something like a compass for the future. As a community, I feel as though it has the potential to energise and mobilise a variety of gifts within our midst.

There is no formal and structured plan at this stage for this 'Season of Discernment' [No 'butchers' paper! - just yet!] With prayer and conversations within our congregations and friends, the odd meeting and discussions that will follow in Parish Council - I am sure that our new vision and/or verandah will emerge in good time - and with the Holy Spirit's help - God's time. I have also found the writing of Simon Sinek helpful and offer a glimpse of his rationale in discerning our way forward together.

A few other things to note:

The Walk of the Cross Pilgrimage - 2027

It is my intention to embark on the fifth Walk of the Cross Pilgrimage from Hopetoun to Warracknabeal in Holy Week: 22-25th March in 2027. We have a well established rhythm and logistics so I cannot see why not! Over the last few years I have tried to keep the pilgrimage more low key due to logistics mainly. I'm not sure whether to make a bit more of our fifth attempt. More anon and any thoughts are welcome.



Parish Centre Revamp

As a parish we have been talking about refreshing the fabric and structure of the Parish Centre for a few years. With the completion of The Shed Project and achieving our goals of our 140 year celebrations, we can now turn our attention and energy to ensuring that the Parish Centre which has served us for so long gets the attention it needs.

Of major concern is the guttering. It is 'tired' (*understatement*) and in need of immediate repair - which will be considerable. This includes guttering and downpipes - especially those housed within the brick walls at the rear. Further, the West window framework and flashing has deteriorated beyond just a simple repair. The toilets need a freshen-up among a few other items on our 'wish list.'

Parish Council have been exploring options on who will be able to co-ordinate the revamp in a systematic way to ensure the Parish Centre's longevity, and are developing a 'Scope of Works' to assist with moving forward. It will be a major undertaking for us all, but one worth doing.

The Shed Project

The Shed Project is absolutely going off! We have a core group of committed participants now that continue the ethos and work ethic that we have been developing since inception. Monday afternoons remain 'Boys only', while Thursday afternoons welcome mixed gender participants. This has been a healthy development in the life of our project. The ZMorph equipment is now operational as part of the Shed Project.

I am most grateful to Brian Clarke whom remains faithful and dedicated to making a difference in our young people's lives through this outreach. Many other mentors (who are not parishioners) continue to support and commit to The Shed Project.

Warracknabeal Primary School Chaplaincy

It has been another full year at WPS. As you can imagine, there is not a dull moment! As well as providing some classroom support, my main activity is facilitating 'Rock&Water' with Year5 students, and "G-Force" - a Hands On experience in the technology wing with identified students.

I will be taking a Sabbatical from my role at WPS in 2027.

The GLAD Program

(Delivered by Wild Echidna Enterprises: Education. Transformation. Mentoring.)

The *Good Living and Development Program* (GLAD) has become a trusted and reliable source of engagement, alternative education and participant wellbeing for a number of schools across the region. From my perspective there are three important things to note: a) I love what I do; b) I am good at it; and, c) I don't see many others (or any) promoting emotional and mental wellbeing in the creative and comprehensive way that I have been able to develop within the GLAD Program.

The Leith Charitable Trust has once again enabled the GLAD Program to help address issues of isolation, disadvantage and wellbeing to young people through all the GLAD programs.

West Wimmera Deanery

The Rural Deanery of West Wimmera incorporates: Horsham, Stawell, Ararat, Nhill and Warracknabeal. We now have parish priests in all centres except Stawell. This means that the Deanery has a renewed vigour to meet and explore socially and professionally our various

ministry opportunities and challenges in the region. I remain the Rural Dean for this group - which essentially means co-ordinating meeting times etc.

I anticipate that there may be opportunities in the future for all members of our parishes to have combined functions and events. Please pray for all in the Deanery for clarity of vision and effective outreach programs and ministry that serve the people of God.

Personal

It's been a good year to consolidate life in the Rectory. Vikki and I remain grateful for its charm and character. The gardens front and back continue to evolve and develop in character also and from time to time some of the fruits of our efforts reach the dining table.

As part of our own 'Season of Discernment' Vik and I are planning to walk the 'Camino Portuguese' on a Sabbatical next year during April and May with both of us taking Long Service Leave. Vik is looking forward to all the new and exiting; sights, smells and sensory stuff of another place. I am looking forward to the physical challenge of the 640kms, discovering somewhere I haven't been before, and the thinking time to reflect on the past, the present and the future as I 'walk into a new phase' in my life.

As I have said in various pastoral contexts over the years, we are determined to 'choose life' rather than life choosing us.

So many good things to appreciate and be grateful for. We look forward to another year of faithful and fruitful ministry together.

We had the benefit of the Bishop visiting twice within a week as we mourned the loss of Father Charles Helms, who has been a regular worshiper in our congregation for many years.

In October we held a Book Fair with many books donated by Father Charles Helms. Our thanks to Gaye and Vikki for the mammoth effort they put in sorting and organising the huge amount of books.

We celebrated the opening of The Shed Project in November. It has been a long journey and the support of the Parish and Community has been overwhelming. It is a great project and a wonderful opportunity for young boys and girls to come together to produce some amazing items. There are between 10-15 boys attend on Mondays and boys and girls on the second and fourth Thursdays.

The 21st March saw us all come together with many visitors including Bishop Garry to celebrate our 140th Anniversary with a High Tea and then a Liturgical service and BBQ lunch the following day. Safe Church Officer Report 25/26

This year was my first in the role of Church Safe Officer. I would like to thank Sarah-Jayne for filling this role for many years and maintaining the necessary records.

I have been on a steep learning curve but it's been pleasing that most of our key personnel have completed the Church Safe training and maintained or updated Working with Children Checks.

I am grateful to the Diocesan Church Safe Officer Kate Schnering for facilitating and leading a parish training day on Saturday February 7. This enabled 15 parishioners from Warracknabeal, 2 from Horsham parish (Rupanyup) and 2 from the West Wimmera (Nhill) to complete the training face to face in a relatively efficient way. The Horsham parish also assisted us by offering training on May 2. I feel this sort of collaboration will be important in other areas in the future.

Should anyone wish to fulfill a role within the parish and has not as yet completed the Church Safe training I would encourage you to contact me to firstly complete a Clearance for Ministry Application. It should then be possible to login and complete the Church Safe training online. I would also encourage everyone to continue to maintain their Working with Children Checks. There is considerably more effort required in reapplying if they are let lapse.

Whilst this compliance is necessary, I do understand the angst this sort of training brings especially the online component can cause. Thank you to all for your patience and persistence.

The Shed Project Report - August 2026

The long awaited Official Opening of The Shed Project in November 2025 has been a significant achievement in the parish over the last year. CONGRATULATIONS to everyone!

So much energy has gone into ensuring that this purpose built shed was completed and we all know what it has 'cost' us. There were a few moments in the past when with sleepless nights we feared our vision would have to surrender to forces beyond our control.

We are delighted to report that The Shed Project is in FULL SWING now!

We have a committed group of participants that are turning up on a regular basis, and this year we have welcomed many new participants who are wanting to enjoy all that this project has to offer. Our hopes and prayers have genuinely been well answered and I am proud of what we are providing for all those who cross the threshold.



The addition of many tools and woodworking machines that Anthony Boerboom donated to the project has made a significant contribution to the capacity and efficiency of what is possible in the shed.

Since the last report, we have also made a couple of significant changes.

Monday afternoons: Previously a primary school only age group - we have extended the scope for all ages, which includes a couple of teenagers. However, Monday evenings is reserved for 'boys only'. It is my firm conviction over many years (and research suggests something similar) that boys need 'male specific safe places' to work out who they are and what is their purpose in life. This does not suggest that they cannot do this without females or significant women in their lives - rather, it is the responsibility of the male community to provide the mentoring and guidance needed to grow healthy, respectful and mature young men.

Thursday afternoons: We now welcome male and female participants to the shed on a Thursday afternoon, which has been a wonderful development to The Shed Project. There are an increasing number of young girls and women who are finding their place in the shed and there is always healthy respect between all participants. There are also a number of young families who have joined the project - which has been an organic evolution of the space.

Mentors: We are also pleased to report that there are a growing number of mentors in the shed who are volunteering their time and energy to help make this a positive experience for all involved. It can get a bit hectic in there at times, however, Brian and I have noticed how many of our participants have been able to focus on their projects, while also lending a hand to others and many significant projects have been completed.

There are still a few minor things that will enhance the shed project experience, and we're working to ensure that this will take place throughout the next year.

Many donations have been made to The Shed Project over the last year that help ensure materials and hardware are available, and the donation of a fridge have ensures that the 'TimTams' are kept cold during the summer.

We remain grateful to the Parish and the Warracknabeal community for their continuing support of this project, and the impact it is having on our small rural town.
